

# Formulating Questions

In this inquiry-based task, you will build upon the introduction to mental illnesses and addictions presented in the Jack Talk by selecting a specific mental illness or addiction from the provided list to explore further. You will then formulate several inquiry questions that follow the criteria for effective questions outlined in class.

## Process:

### 1. Select a Topic

Choose one mental illness or addiction from the provided list.

### 2. Brainstorming

Create a mind map — or another brainstorming method of your choice — to capture your initial thoughts and questions regarding your topic.

- Causes and Risk Factors
- Signs and Symptoms
- Diagnosis and Treatment
- Personal Impact
- Community Impact

### 3. Question Development

Follow the Question Formulation Technique (QFT) discussed in class.

- Produce questions
- Improve questions
- Prioritize questions
- Reflect and revise questions
- Peer review
- Refine final guiding questions

## Product:

You should aim to have at least one question for each of the subtopics:

- Causes and Risk Factors
- Signs and Symptoms
- Diagnosis and Treatment
- Personal Impact
- Community Impact

### Mood disorders

- Depression
- Bipolar disorder

### Anxiety disorders

- Specific phobia

### Personality disorders

- Borderline personality disorder
- Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder
- Antisocial personality disorder

- Alcohol Use
- Cannabis Use
- Opioid Use
- Commercial Tobacco Use

- Schizophrenia
- Delusional disorder

## Assessment Criteria:

### Open-Ended Nature

- Do the questions encourage detailed responses and further investigation?
- Are the questions structured to avoid a single, straightforward answer?

### Clarity and Specificity

- Do the questions clearly convey what information or insight is being sought?
- Are the questions free from vague or broad terms?

### Complexity and Depth

- Do the questions require more than surface-level thinking or simple recall of information?
- How well do the questions challenge the respondent to think critically?

### Exploratory Potential

- Do the questions allow for multiple viewpoints or interpretations?
- How well do the questions encourage further inquiry or exploration of related issues?
